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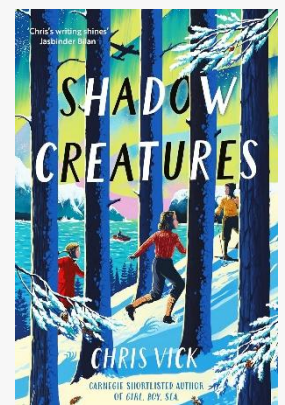
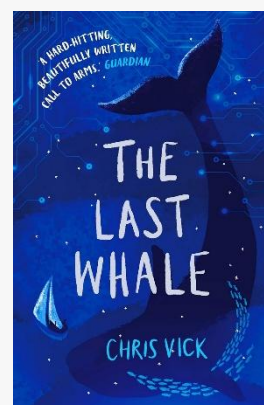
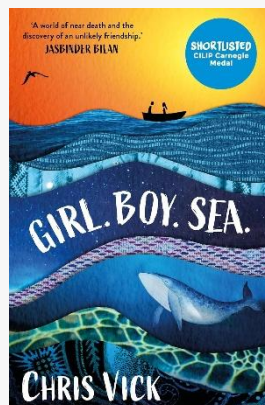
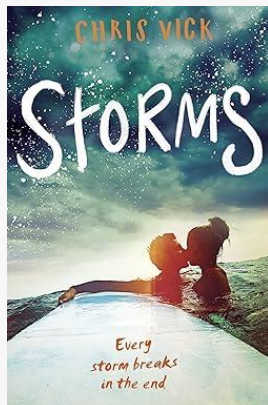
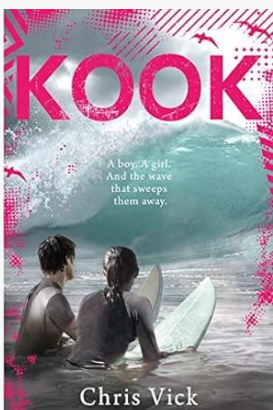
AWARD-WINNING AUTHOR TO VISIT PHHS

World Book Day takes place this year on Thursday 5 March and we are delighted to be marking this annual celebration of books with a visit on Friday 6 March from **Chris Vick**, an award-winning children's author and conservationist.



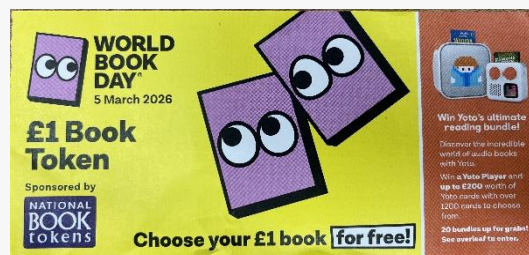
He will be presenting assemblies to Year 9 and Year 10 and lead a creative writing workshop with selected students. Chris writes books for young people about the sea, danger and the wonder of magic and stories. He spent years working in whale conservation before enrolling on the Bath Spa MA in Writing for Young People. He has written five books, published in several countries.

Chris has appeared at many festivals including Hay, Bath Children's Literature Festival and Mare di Libri (Sea of Books) in Italy, and has written blogs/features for the *Guardian* and *Bustle.com* on YA (Young Adult) issues.

The National Year of Reading 2026

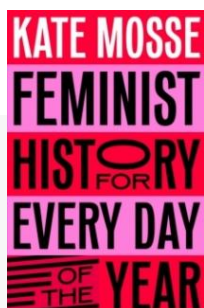
GO ALL IN.

International Women's Day: 8 March

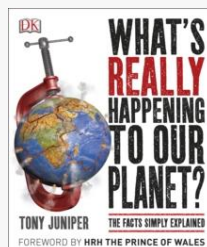
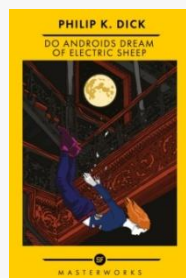
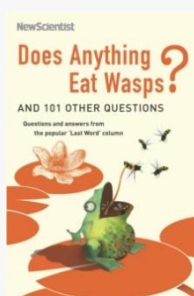
